Housing - Definition of affordable housing	We need the City of Hamilton's affordable housing definition to prioritize housing for ODSP & OW recipients, fixed income seniors and low wage workers - target low to moderate incomes (\$30,000 individuals / \$60,000 households and under).	Yes	Affordable housing should be based on the average income for the area, not the city as a whole. Affordable housing should also be geared to be affordable for people living on Ontario Disability Support Program and Ontario Works.

I would continue to support that, especially if we can bring Bike Share to Ward 4. There is also a discussion happening about free transit which is exciting.
	Freeze Hamilton's Urban Boundary (already voted on by Hamilton City Council)	Yes	I would continue to support keeping the current urban boundary. We are privileged to have access to some of the most nutritious soil in Canada. We must protect it.
	City wide sidewalk snow removal	Yes	I met a man who is being treated for cancer, living off his
