


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INTRODUCTION

On October 24th, 2022 there will be a new city council in Ottawa. That means we have a real opportunity to elect a city council that works for tenants, single parents, people with disabilities, students, immigrants, the working poor and ALL low and moderate income people.

We deserve a City Hall that understands the urgency of the housing crisis, and puts the needs of struggling tenants before the wants of developers. We need STRONG affordable housing policies and we need them now.

This report reviews city councillors' positions on major housing files that ACORN members participated in between 2018 and 2022.

Our mission is to identify for our members which city councillors, when push came to shove, stood up for affordable housing or sided with developers.

The next term of council will vote on the final policy of Inclusionary Zoning and what steps the City will take to tackle renovictions and demovictions. This is why it's so important to have Housing Champions on city council who will advocate for policies that reflect the right to housing.



WHAT IS ACORN?

ACORN (Association of Community Organizations for Reform Now) Canada is a multi-issue, membership-based community union of low- and moderate-income people. We believe that social and economic justice can best be achieved by building community power for change. Each member has a vote, and only members speak for the organization and have the authority to set the policy and determine the tactics of each group.

Our local and national boards are elected directly from our membership.

We have a long and deep history of organizing in low- and moderate-income neighbourhoods, fighting and winning change through a variety of means - including door knocking; petitioning; local, regional, and national meetings (both internal and public forums); and last but not least, peaceful direct actions - all building power in the process.

We have over 160,000 members organized into twenty-four neighbourhood chapters in nine cities across Canada. In the National Capital Region we have over 32,000 members.

Since 2004 we have won several important victories including payday lending legislation, raises in the minimum wage, housing rights by-laws across the country, affordable internet programs, disability rights and more.



CHANGE

The Agenda for Change is ACORN's grassroots municipal election campaign.

The Agenda for Change is a long term organizing strategy that focuses on building lists of progressive voters in strategic wards through doorknocking. We talk to people on the doors about what issues they care about this election. This helped inform our Agenda for Change platform of issues.

To date, the Agenda for Change has knocked on doors and called thousands of low and moderate income tenants across the city, organized outreach training events with our members, surveyed

candidates on our platform and more!

Unsurprisingly, the number one issue that came up on the doors was housing.

This is why ACORN members, as part of the Agenda for Change, have chosen to examine the housing voting records of city councillors running for re-election.



We looked at major housing votes that ACORN members participated in over this past term of council. These include:

- The demoviction of 142 Nepean St when City Council chose to approve the demolition of 6 affordable housing units for a parking lot
- The demovictions of Herongate when City Council approved more redevelopment under the guise it would create more affordable housing but only for those making \$109,000/year
- The decision to put Stage 3 LRT through the homes of 120 low income and working class families living in Manor Village

- The introduction of a permitting system for Airbnbs and short term rentals to stop ghost hotels from replacing potential affordable housing
- The decision NOT to implement a pilot program of a landlord registration system recommended by an outside consultant to address chronic disrepair and unsafe housing conditions
- The decision to NOT increase the capital affordable housing budgets in 2021 and 2022 so that the City could build more deeply affordable housing



While the votes on the previous page split council, there were other important votes on housing that passed unanimously. For example:

- Creating a working group to support Manor Village tenants with relocation
- Exploring rental replacement bylaws, anti displacement policies, tenant defense funds and proactive tenant education programs
- Making changes to staff's direction to craft an Inclusionary Zoning Policy that slightly increased affordability
- Introducing new rental management and pest control bylaws
- Redefining "affordable housing" in the Official Plan

However, in all cases these only got mass support from council because they were concessions to appease developers or studies rather than actual policies. What was passed was not representative of what housing advocates and tenants had been calling for to truly address the housing crisis at hand. Even still, council only voted in favour of these decisions because of public pressure from ACORN members' community organizing.

For this reason, these votes are not included in the summary of councillors' voting records. Rather councillors are deemed 'Housing Champions' based on how they voted on housing files that split council, forcing them to make a choice between affordable housing & developers' interests. We also factored in how much of their 2018 election campaign was funded by the industry thanks to Horizon Ottawa's 'Follow the Money' report.



CATHERINE MCKENNEY 100%

Catherine McKenney was a Housing Champion 15/15 votes. They received zero donations from the development industry.



SHAWN MENARD 100%

Shawn Menard was a Housing Champion 14/14 votes. He received zero donations from the development industry.



RAWLSON KING 100%

Rawlson King was a Housing Champion 11/11 votes. He received zero donations from the development industry.



JEFF LEIPER 86%

Jeff Leiper was a Housing Champion 12/14 votes. He received zero donations from the development industry.



THERESA KAVANAGH 82%

Theresa Kavanagh was a Housing Champion 9/11 votes. She received zero donations from the development industry.



RILEY BROCKINGTON

62%

Riley Brockington was a Housing Champion 8/13 votes. 19% of his 2018 election campaign was funded by the development industry.



GLEN GOWER 15%

Glen Gower was a Housing Champion 2/13 votes. 2% of his 2018 election campaign was funded by the development industry



MATTHEW LULOFF 14%

Matthew Luloff was a Housing Champion 2/14 votes. 8% of his 2018 election campaign was funded by the development industry



CATHERINE KITTS 9%

Catherine Kitts was a Housing Champion 1/11 votes. 60% of her 2018 election campaign was funded by the development industry



CATHY CURRY 0%

Cathy Curry was a Housing Champion 0/3 votes. It is unknown if she took any developer donations.



LAURA DUDAS 0%

Laura Dudas was a Housing Champion 0/13 votes. 16% of her 2018 election campaign was funded by the development industry.



GEORGE DAROUZE 0%

George Darouze was a Housing Champion 0/12 votes. 78% of his 2018 election campaign was funded by the development industry



TIM TIERNEY 0%

Tim Tierney was a Housing Champion 0/14 votes. 80% of his 2018 election campaign was funded by the development industry



ALLAN HUBLEY 0%

Allan Hubley was a Housing Champion 0/13 votes. 99% of his 2018 election campaign was funded by the development industry

OBSERVATIONS

After looking at the results of these votes, ACORN members can confidently call the following city councillors 'Housing Champions':

Catherine McKenney, Shawn Menard and Rawlson King all had 100% voting records in support of housing and 0% of their campaigns were funded by developers. Jeff Leiper was at 86% with zero developer donations and Theresa Kavanagh was at 82% with zero developer donations.

The only other councillor who had over 50% support for housing was **Riley Brockington**. His voting record showed support 62% of the time and 19% of his campaign was funded by the development industry.

The remaining city councillors only supported strong affordable housing policies 15% or less of the time.

Based on their voting records, any time George Darouze, Laura Dudas, Tim Tierney and Allan Hubley, were met with а choice between supporting the community supporting developers - they chose developers every single time. We'll note that Cathy Curry was also in this group but has had a much shorter time on council.

The donations from developers in this group are substantial. 78% of George Darouze's campaign was funded by developers as was 80% of Tierney's and 99% of Hubley's.



It is no surprise to ACORN members and many others across Ottawa that councillors with zero developer funding stood up for STRONG affordable housing policies the overwhelming majority of the time. Even when being lobbied hard by developers. On the opposite side, councillors with 78-99% support from developers rarely voted in favour of these policies.

ACORN members have high hopes that on October 24th we can elect more Housing Champions to city council.

ACORN is calling on candidates running to be our next city council, to commit to supporting:

- A STRONG Inclusionary Zoning Policy with 25-35% affordable housing citywide in perpetuity
- An Anti Displacement Policy to protect tenants at risk of demoviction
- A Renoviction Bylaw to stop landlords from mass evicting tenants under the guise of major renovations
- A Landlord Registration System to allow for proactive inspections by the City so tenants aren't forced to live in squalor
